MIDWIFERY

1. How may alterations in the normal attitude of the foetus complicate labour, and how are such complications to be dealt with?

2. Under what circumstances may an extra-uterine pregnancy go on to term, and how would you deal with such a case? Discuss the relative advantages of sequestration and marsupialization in dealing with the placenta.

3. What bony contractions may be encountered at the pelvic outlet, and in what varieties of pelvic deformity do they usually occur? Discuss the treatment that may be called for, indicating the relative advantages and disadvantages of each method.

4. Give the guiding principles which would determine your treatment of pregnancy complicated by (1) a fibroid of the uterus; and (2) *carcinoma cervicis*.
