NEUROLOGY.

1. A man receives a gunshot wound which seriously damages the left half of the Spinal Cord at the level of the upper border of the twelfth dorsal vertebra, without doing other mischief of importance. Describe—(a) the immediate results; (b) the probable later effects; (c) the changes which would be found in the Cord if death occurred two months later.

2. What are the principal characters and distinctions of the movements in the following diseases:—Paralysis Agitans, Senile Tremor, Chorea, Writers' Cramp, Athetosis?

3. A machinery accident has caused serious injury to, and partial rupture of, the third, fourth, and fifth Cervical Nerves on one side. What would be the nature and distribution of the consequent lesions?

4. By what symptoms might you recognise the presence of a Tumour which had caused considerable enlargement of the pituitary body?
